## New Shelter Update

Editor's Note: The following update is what has been going since our announcement of a new shelter.

We were ready and rearing to go, but the big wait was getting approval from county and state on the plans and then to get all the permits to do the construction and remodel. Geo-Site. Ltd which owns the building, has done both the design work and the permanent renovations and we can't thank them enough.

As of end of July, the building had all the carpet taken up and talk about a job! It was so glued down, the guys had to boil water to put on the carpet to help soften the glue enough to use huge floor scrapers. Needless to say, not an easy job. And since there was still some glue, the floors had to be tiled.

Next came digging a ditch in the back to get ready to lay drain pipe to the already existing line. This drain pipe is for the drains in the dog kennel area.

While the guys were doing some of this work, it was noted that some of the window sills have rotted



out. They used wood frames and did not seal it well. So new windows might have to be added to the list of items needed for the shelter. The foreman on the job will be looking and deciding if the same windows can be used and just make new frames or not.

The concrete floor in the dog kennel area was jackhammered up. Not all of it, but where the drains for the dog kennels will be. The drain lines were put in and new concrete poured. We are also going to have a new concrete front. There is currently one step up into the building. This will change to be a long slope from parking lot to front door to allow easier access for our

supporters with mobility concerns.

Once all the concrete was poured and set up (hardened), block walls for the dog kennels were put in. These will make cleaning much easier and help keep disease down.

We've put construction photos throughout this issue of the newsletter and invite you to look and see the amazing things that have been happening throughout this summer and the help we need from you for the magic to continue.

### Pet Tip: Allergies

This has been an awful summer for human and pet allergies. Most households have at least one family member who suffers from seasonal allergies and we're just starting ragweed season.

Just like with us, there are many causes of pet allergies: dander, pollen, mold, flea salvia and food.

Pets who have allergies can have itching, watery or goopy eyes, ear infections and may develop hot spots. These hot spots are raw areas where the pet has licked and dug at the skin.

There are many ways to treat these symptoms including special soothing baths, topical and over-the-counter and prescription medications. Chronic on-going allergies may require testing and allergy shots.

The best place to start is a trip to the vet's for an examination. Your vet can work with you to develop a treatment plan specifically for your pet.

# Pets Make Great Reading Partners

Can reading to a dog raise children's reading levels? According to studies on the subject a young student's reading scores can advance significantly — two to four grade levels — by reading to a dog for just 20 minutes a week throughout the school year (40 weeks).

The American Library
Association estimates that
there are 27 million functionally illiterate adults in
the United States. The
national "America Reads"
program notes that 40
percent of fourth graders
read below their grade
level, and that children
who don't master reading
by the third grade risk

falling further behind.

Children who read to pets have less absenteeism, visit the library more often, and improve their grades on report cards. Also, children with low self-esteem are often more willing to interact with an animal than with another person. Pets can also teach children empathy and compassion.

## Getting Kids Excited About Reading

"We didn't invent the concept of a child reading to a pet, but we were the first to use the structure," said Kathy Klotz, executive director of the Reading Education Assistance Dogs program (R.E.A.D.). She refers to depictions of people read-

ing to dogs in Victorian times, and she has heard several adults admit that they used to read to their dog in the closet as a child. "There is no question that children are terribly eager to read to a dog."

Parents don't necessarily have to wait until a program like R.E.A.D. comes to their child's school. They can try this at home with their children, Klotz said, as long as the dog or cat is trained and able to stay calm for at least 20 minutes while the child reads to it.


